The Tipi of Hope Foundation (Tipi of Hope) operates across Canada, in what is also known as Turtle Island. We are a remote office with our Board of Directors currently in the provinces known as Alberta and Nova Scotia. Accordingly, we have the following Acknowledgment Statements:

We wish to acknowledge that the land on which some of us gather is the traditional territories of the Niitsitapi (Blackfoot) and the people of the Treaty 7 region in Southern Alberta, which includes the Siksika, the Piikani, the Kainai, the Tsuut'ina, and the Stoney Nakoda First Nations, including Chiniki, Bearpaw, and Wesley First Nations. The City of Calgary is also home to the Métis Nation of Alberta, Regions 5 and 6.

We honour and acknowledge the land where we are a guest. We are in Mi'kma'ki, the ancestral and unceded territory of the Mi'kmaq People. The "Treaties of Peace and Friendship" covers this territory, which the Mi'kmaq and Wolastoqiyik (Maliseet) people first signed with the British Crown in 1725. The treaties did not deal with the surrender of lands and resources but recognized Mi'kmaq and Wolastoqiyik (Maliseet) titles and established the rules for what was to be an ongoing relationship between nations.

The Tipi of Hope Foundation honours all First Nations, Inuit, and Métis peoples and their valuable past and present contributions to this land.



The Spirit of the Bends

For generations, Métis, Inuit, and First Nations (Indigenous Peoples) have created intricate, bead-woven traditional pieces like garments and works of art. During this process, Indigenous Peoples will occasionally string a bead of an unmatched color into their design. This intentionally-placed rogue bead is often called a spirit bead.

The spirit bead represents an act of humility, recognizing the inherent imperfections of humans and showing respect to our creator.

This Strategic Plan aligns with this sentiment to allow imperfection of yourself and celebrate that which makes you unique. We strive to be intentionally different from what you may expect to create meaningful and lasting change and actions of reconciliation.

The journey of creating the Tipi of Hope Foundation (Tipi of Hope) has been a work of art and a dream. Individual pieces coming together to create something beautiful. Beads with diverse origins strung together in harmony.

With each bead, we will continuously grow. One bead at a time, we've strung the plans of Tipi of Hope together. Our opportunities (perhaps a red bead instead of a yellow one) are initiatives we're working towards. Thanks for being alongside us on this journey. We're beading together to achieve reconciliation.

Programs


